Step 1: Explore how we can take action to build inclusive, caring and sustainable communities

Use the Teacher's Guide on the following pages to explore key questions related to positive community impact.

Step 2: Writing Prompt

Read the Sample Letter below. Have your pupils use the writing template to write their own letters about how they nurture their communities for the future. They can add a picture to their letter so we can see their ideas realised, too!

Step 3: Check your Work

Encourage your pupils to use our handwriting checklist to self-edit their work!

Step 4: Send it in!

We hope you're excited to participate in An Post's annual Writing Competition. We've put together a Teacher's Guide to help you facilitate letter writing in your class.

1. Introduction

- Show the slides to the pupils and ask prompting questions. The pupils can engage in think-pair-share and may need some prompting in places.
- What does 'community' mean?
- What communities are you a part of? (Think about your town, your clubs, places you like to visit)
- What do you like about your communities?
- How do you protect or look after your community?
- How does it make you feel to be part of a community?
- Why is it important to be in a community?

• Next Slide:

- What is the postman doing?
- What is happening with the car?
- Why is the lady smiling?
- Remind pupils it is important to build community around us, like the postie is doing when he delivers letters.
- Explain some of the key vocabulary to the pupils.
 - **Nurture:** "giving love, care, and attention to help things, people or communities grow and be happy".
 - **Community:** "a group of people living in a particular area or who have common interests such as the sport they play".
 - **Sustainable:** "taking care of planet Earth so it stays healthy for a long, long time".
 - **Reduce, Reuse, Recycle:** "ways to be kinder to planet Earth and to make less waste".
 - Biodiversity: "the different plants and animals living in nature".
 - **Diversity:** "having friends who are different in cool ways".
 - Inclusion: "making sure everyone has a chance to join in and play together".

• **Discuss** (as a whole class, in groups or pairs) the pictures that the pupils see on the slides that follow. Encourage discussion on the images, use them as a stimulus and to gauge pupils' understanding of the topics. Elicit and question as necessary to help deepen their understanding and appreciation of the importance of nurturing inclusive and caring communities.

Reading and Writing

- Read the sample letter to the pupils. If possible, display it to them too at the same time, so that they can see the layout of the letter.
- Question the pupils on the letter on slides:
 - What ideas does Sebby have in his letter?
 - Why do you think he wants us to tell other people?
 - What other ideas might you have?
 - Who else could we encourage to get involved?
 - How can you nurture your communities?
- Have pupils compose a letter discussing the ways in which we can nurture initiatives to make our communities more sustainable, inclusive, and caring for the future.
- Have pupils use the template provided to write their letter.
- Have pupils self-check their letters, using the letter writing checklist provided.

3. Entry Submission

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- Write the final version of the letter in the template provided. A copy could be made of the letters and retained for the pupils to display in an area in the classroom or shared with parents.
- Complete the entry form and send entries to the address on page 1 of this document.

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Sample Letter

Read and discuss the letter below. Think about actions that can be taken to nurture communities based on Sebby's letter.
