To participate in the An Post "Nurturing the Community" Writing Competition, complete the following steps. The following pages will help your pupils create their individual entries!

Step 1: Explore how we can take action to build inclusive, caring and sustainable communities

Use the Teacher's Guide on the following pages to explore key questions related to positive community impact.

Step 2: Writing Prompt

Read the Sample Letter below. Have your pupils use the writing template to write their own letters about how they nurture their communities for the future. They can add a picture to their letter so we can see their ideas realised, too!

Step 3: Check your Work

Encourage your pupils to use our handwriting checklist to self-edit their work!

Step 4: Send it in!

We hope you're excited to participate in An Post's annual Writing Competition. We've put together a Teacher's Guide to help you facilitate letter writing in your class.

1. Introduction

Show the slides to the pupils and ask prompting questions. The pupils can engage in think-pair-share and may need some prompting in places.

- What does 'community' mean?
- What communities are you a part of? (Think about your town, your clubs, places you like to visit)
- What do you like about your communities?
- How do you protect or look after your community?
- How does it make you feel to be part of a community?
- Why is it important to be in a community?
- An Post Video
 - Show the pupils the video. Question pupils for their understanding.

Reflect on the video

- How do An Post leave their mark on communities?
- Who is affected by the work of An Post?
- How do you leave your mark on your community?
- Who do you help? Who are you kind to? Why?
- What else might you do to help others in your community?
- How could you leave the biggest and best mark on your community?

Define key words related to the lesson plan:

- **Nurture:** "giving love, care, and attention to help things, people or communities grow and be happy".
- **Community:** "a group of people living in a particular area or who have common interests such as the sport they play".
- **Sustainable:** "taking care of planet Earth so it stays healthy for a long, long time".
- **Reduce, Reuse, Recycle:** "ways to be kinder to planet Earth and to make less waste".
- **Biodiversity:** "the different plants and animals living in nature".
- **Diversity:** "having friends who are different in cool ways".

- **Inclusion:** "making sure everyone has a chance to join in and play together".
- **Discuss** (as a whole class, in groups or pairs) what the pupils themselves can individually do (and what change they could inspire in their communities) to nurture their communities in terms of: sustainability, biodiversity, reducing, reusing and recycling, diversity, inclusion and reading for all. Use the slides to scaffold the discussion.

2. Reading and Writing

- Read the sample letter to the pupils. If possible, display it to them too at the same time, so that they can see the layout of the letter.
- Question the pupils on the letter on slides:
 - Who are Mark's friends?
 - What do Mark's friends recommend?
 - How might you reply to Mark?
 - Who do you think should nurture the community? Why?
 - What do you think you could do to motivate your community to get involved?
- Have pupils compose a letter discussing the ways in which we can nurture initiatives to make our communities more sustainable, inclusive, and caring for the future.
- Have pupils use the template provided to write their letter.
- Have pupils self-check their letters, using the letter writing checklist provided.

3. Entry Submission

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- Write the final version of the letter in the template provided. A copy could be made of the letters and retained for the pupils to display in an area in the classroom or shared with parents.
- Complete the entry form and send entries to the address on page 1 of this document.

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Sample Letter

Read and discuss the letter below. Think about actions that can be taken to nurture communities based on Mark's letter.

Dear 3rd and 4th Class,

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25/02/24

I hope this letter finds you safe and well. Recently, I've been thinking a lot about the beautiful communities that I am a part of and how I could make a positive impact on them. I've been looking around and have been really inspired by the action some people are taking. I wanted to share some cool ideas with you and inspire a ripple effect of positive change!

My first inspiration came from my friend Rory. He created "Rory's Recycling Registry" for his school. That gave everyone an idea of how to recycle every piece of waste in school. He also advises re-using materials - he is the reason I started writing on both sides of the page! I was thinking of putting together a guide for my school to share all of the knowledge I learned from my friend and put the ideas into practice in my own school community.

Have you ever heard of sustainability? My friend Greta inspired her school community by writing a letter and sharing it with every class in her school. She even shared it with other schools in her town. What does Greta recommend? We can learn about the small changes we can make, like using energy-efficient light bulbs and turning off appliances when not needed, to have a positive impact on our communities. When we share these messages with our communities, they can inspire loads of people and make a big difference.

My friend Ben has been telling me all about biodiversity and how his After School Club has been thinking of ways that we can change our environments to keep them diverse. He told me that we can plant wildflowers so bees can pollinate areas, not cut our grass as often and even grow our own vegetables. My town has a community garden where I could definitely use those ideas!

My final piece of inspiration came from my Grandma... She asked me if I could teach her how to use the Internet to do some research online, and I thought about all the other elderly people that might not have a grandchild to ask. So, I talked to my teacher about sharing skills with residents of the local nursing home, and let me tell you - she loved the idea! Now we have two days of skill-sharing per week, with volunteers in every class! Last week, I showed a man named Patrick how to find gardening videos online and he shared some stories about my town from before I was even born! I loved learning more about the history of my community.

Now, it's your turn to spread the community cheer - imagine if our ideas could reach every corner of the community! What could you do to spread the message for everyone to get involved? I want to hear all of your ideas.

Remember, even the smallest actions can create big waves of change. By sharing how we nurture our communities with others, we become ambassadors for a world full of better, more inclusive and caring communities. I can't wait to hear your amazing ideas and see how our actions can make a world of difference!
